

Dearly beloved,


The emotions of Holy Week wash over me as I recall the first Easter. I am humbled by the courage of the women and his disciples. glorious resurrection.

Anxiety had turned knees to water and dried up desperate hope. The events of



Was this some sort of last final humiliation from the religious and political leaders who had betrayed him? Where had they put him, the beloved, whose body had been brutally tormented and at great cost preserved? Who had taken what had been so desperately bargained for? His mother, the mother of his closest followers and some of closest followers had guarded his body and stood as near as they could as he breathed his last breath. He had been crucified and vilified by the great men of the great powers. At great price two of his secret followers put their reputation and possibly their lives on the line to request the body of their teacher to give him a decent burial. There was no assurance that this request would be granted. In fact, there was a great reason to believe it would not be. When it was, when Pontius Pilate, against all expectation, had allowed Jesus' followers to collect his body from the cross and place him on the burial shelf in Joseph of Arimathea's newly cut tomb, it seemed as if some morsel of dignity could be salvaged from a horrific death.

Jesus' body had lain, on a shelf, in Joseph's tomb. He was wrapped, according to Jewish burial custom in a shroud. A tight piece of cloth encircled his beloved face, to ensure that his mouth and his jaw would remain closed. Jesus' detractors had sought to silence the resonate voice, that warmed the hearts of his listeners and pierced the conscience of his detractors. This morning, to complete the burial ritual, the courageous women went to the tomb with spices. The



But this, even this, seemed to be denied them. Instead of Jesus' body, they were confronted with a young man, in a blinding white robe. It was not their beloved they found but a youth with a message, a message that began, as all messages of God's angels did with the immortal words, "Fear not". "Fear not, for I bring you tidings of great joy," the angels had proclaimed to the shepherds at Jesus' birth. "Fear nothing; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised again; he is not here; look, there is the place where they laid him. But go and give this message to his disciples and Peter: He is going on before you into Galilee; there you will see him, as he told you."

They ran to tell Peter that the resurrection had occurred. They ran to tell the disciples that Jesus' body was no longer in the tomb and that they would see him again in Galilee. Jesus' physical body had been transformed in the tomb, as surely as the body of a seed is transformed in the earth. It dies, but is not gone. Through the miracle of God's continuing and miraculous creative activity, radical transformation had occurred. Jesus' physical body had been transformed into a recognizable, touchable, spiritual body. Jesus was resurrected and now Jesus asks us? What will we do with this glorious resurrection? Will we take the angel's message to heart and "Fear not?" Will we be courageous as the early disciples were courageous and tell everyone of the radical, transforming news of Jesus' resurrection and the difference it has made in our lives? Will we hide in the tomb or will we emerge to new, glorious and courageous life as we proclaim Jesus' glorious resurrection to the world?

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#### **GETTING READY TO WALK**

Louisville is expecting some visitors in May, and we need to be ready to feed and house them. No, not the out-of-town visitors who will stream to Churchill Downs at the beginning of the month, but a group of Presbyterians who'll descend on the city at the end of the month!

Gregory Kelsey:

Who's coming? About 15-20 Presbyterians from the organization Fossil Free PC(USA). What's that? A group advocating for the church to divest of its investments in fossil fuel companies. Why divest? Because these companies create products that cause the climate to change in unknown ways. And, because it makes no sense for Presbyterians to profit (from investments in these companies) that are responsible for climate disruption.

Why is Fossil Free PC(USA) coming to Louisville in late May? Louisville has the church's headquarters. What will they do here? Start to walk. Huh?

Since the PC(USA) General Assembly begins in St. Louis on June 16, Fossil Free is going to walk from Louisville to St. Louis (about 260 miles) from June 1-16, to promote the divestment overture. That overture, requesting that the Presbyterian Foundation and the Board of Pensions divest from fossil fuel companies, was agreed on by the BRP Session, proposed to the Mid-Kentucky Presbytery, and passed the Presbytery, joining 30 or so Presbyteries who are asking the church to act.

If you'd prefer not to walk to St. Louis (or even part of the way), there are a few things you can do to help:

- 1. Come to BRP on the evening of May 31. We will have dinner that evening at 6:00 p.m. You can enjoy conversation with members of Fossil Free who are going to walk.
- 2. Offer your house as a place for folks to stay one night (May 31). Having a comfortable bed will be nice, but our visitors are bringing sleeping bags and can easily sleep on your floor.
  - 3. Provide a light breakfast on Friday, June 1.
- 4. Provide transportation to PC(USA) Headquarters the morning of June 1. You can plan to stay for the opening worship service prior to the beginning of the walk.
- 5. Follow the progress of the walk on the Fossil Free website (presbypeacefellowship.org), from June 1-15.
- 6. Follow the activities at the General Assembly from June 16-20, using pcusa.org.

Please contact the church office (451-8305) and let us know if you'll be able to provide housing and transportation for our visitors.

#### A MESSAGE FROM JOHN ODOM

Church as an immigration station, a welcome center, a resettlement bureau—these images came to mind as I reflected on Paul's wisdom to the church in Philippi, "But our citizenship is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ" (Philippians 3:20).

As citizens of heaven, Christ-followers are to witness to what is true about God and invite others into the "Better Ways of Jesus." The role of our local congregations and of Mid-Kentucky Presbytery as a whole is to become welcoming centers and conduits into God's Commonwealth.

Since our primary citizenship is of heaven, Christians know deeply what it is like to live as resident aliens. We—who live as citizens of God's county and citizens of the world—are uniquely poised to facilitate ministry among immigrants and refugees and to help neighbors of all kinds navigate inter-culturally. For we, too, have the experience of being strangers in a strange land. We know the tension and challenge inherent in living in one place when our ultimate allegiance is to another. We, too, know the tension and struggle in seeking to embody Jesus' prayer, "Thy will be done on earth as it is in Heaven."

So what are some practical ways that the Church can live into its immigration-station, welcome-center, resettlement-bureau identity?

- Go to neighbors/immigrants/refugees with the compassion and hospitality of Jesus. In a post-Christian America, growing numbers of our neighbors have never been invited into the home of a practicing Christian, let alone Presbyterian. They do not know us, or our values, because we often keep to ourselves. What if we went "to" our neighbors with welcome, love, and hospitality?
- Throw parties. People of all nationalities like to celebrate. What if we helped with that? What if we joined with neighbors and immigrant friends and had parties and invited them? Or helped them with their own celebrations?
- Offer resources. People have a need for connection and community. What if the church became the go-to place to help meet those needs? Assistance with education, recovery, parenting, and many other things can be provided by churches who seek to serve their neighbors. All of these things can provide opportunities for relationship building and gospel witness.

Immigration station, welcome center, resettlement bureau—I encourage you to engage with these images of the church. Let them give shape to your ministry and action as together we seek to live out our citizenship of heaven here on the earth.
