

Dearly beloved,

Spring is finally here. After the freezing rain and biting cold, it is a delicious gift. The air is soft, the trees are budding, birds are singing, leaves are bursting forth and we can finally feel the warmth of the sun. It is as if we too have burst forth from the cold of winter into a world bursting with possibilities.

One of my mother's friends gave me a slim book of poetry when I was about ten. The first poem that I read when I opened the pretty yellow cover began with the words, "To see the world". I've always thought of it by that name. I love that little poem, "To see the world in a grain of sand / And heaven in a wild flower / Hold infinity in the palm of your hand / And eternity in an hour." Not surprisingly the little poem is actually the first four lines of a much longer poem called "Auguries of Innocence" written by that master poet William Blake.

I always loved the idea that the tiniest part of the universe like a grain of sand or a wildflower could give us a glimpse into the mystical, artistic mind of God. There is so much of a miracle of the coming again of life into the world that it is hard to believe that all this beauty is mere happenstance or the result of a random combination of atoms and energy. It is all so beautiful - so breathtakingly beautiful.

It is as if God is calling to us and we proudly tell others about our love with the luminous words of the Song of Songs, "My beloved speaks and says to me: 'Arise, my love, my fair one, and come away; for now the winter is past, the rain is over and gone. The flowers appear on the earth; the time of singing has come, and the voice of the turtledove is heard in our land, The fig tree puts forth its figs, and the vines are in blossom; they give forth fragrance. Arise, my love, my fair one, and come away."

It is as if that lovely little ballad, "Today" has cajoled us into relaxing into happy luxuroius warmth. "Today, while the blossoms still cling to the vine, I'll taste your strawberries, I'll drink your sweet wine. A million tomorrows will all pass away, Ere I forget, all the joy, that is mine today." Today is beautiful, not only because of the blossoming of spring but because of the love that surrounds us and calls us onward.

MARCH 27, 2019 SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

The Moderator's report on April 16, 2019 established a sober tone which characterized the entire meeting.

Rev. Nebelsick highlighted the pastoral needs of the membership at present with multiple persons hospitalized, needing nursing home or intensive home care.

Rev. Nebelsick shared a model policy for selective organizations that is recommended by our insurance company for the church. The policy addresses policies and actions for the reduction of risks of abuse occurrences and false allegations. The need for our staff to be trained and well supported in the provision of ministry to children and adolescents, particularly to persons who have experienced dislocation and traumatic experiences, was processed. The Clerk of Session agreed to edit the model policy in a manner appropriate to the needs of BRPC.

During the receipt of Committee reports, a motion was approved to increase the budget of the Mission Committee by \$1200 for scholarships to Cedar Ridge Camp.

A new sexton, Corey Bullitt, is hired and has begun caring for the building. He is warmly welcomed as a friend since his father previously worked for BRPC.

SUMMER SUNDAY SCHOOL BREAK

During the school year, we provide Christian education for people of every age beginning at 9:30 a.m. But during the summer . . . the routine changes and the classes ease into more informal and/or spontaneous gatherings. The adult Sunday morning class is continuing to meet, but the last for children and youth CE program will be May 19th. The fall schedule will resume in September.
